## Background

Paso, an Argentine wine project nestled in the scenic Tupungato Valley, blossomed from the shared vision of Norberto Páez and Sebastián Bisole. Childhood friends and academic companions, they explored winemaking at the Universidad de Cuyo where an experimental winery sparked their oenological passion. The project started with just Malbec and Bonarda, which they fermented in old, rebuilt barrels in a friend's garage (hence the name of the line 'Garage'). Paso, whose inaugural vintage was in 2016, was named for the art of crafting wine deliberately, step by step (paso a paso). In addition to their original old-vine Malbec and Bonarda, Norberto and Sebastián have focused on resurrecting Criolla grapes, which are Vinifera crossings unique to South America. These varieties make up the white, orange, and clarete wines. Eschewing new oak in favor of stainless steel, concrete, or used oak, Paso's winemaking highlights typicity and varietal character, resulting in delightfully zippy, energetic, wines—a compelling choice for aficionados of low-intervention, soulful wines that speak of place.

## Highlights

- 1** **Paso, started by Norberto Páez and Sebastián Bisole, makes low-intervention wines from the Uco Valley, a sub region of Mendoza.**
- 2** **The wines are made with traditional varieties (Malbec, Bonarda, and various Criollas) in stainless steel, concrete, and used oak.**
- 3** **The hand-drawn packaging, which is whimsical yet neat, adds to the unfiltered, low-intervention, raw-meets-clean ethos.**

## Wines



### Paso Uno - Los Criollas de Don Graciano SRP \$20

This range includes a white and a clarete whose 60-year-old vines are farmed by Don Graciano.



### Paso Dos - Skin Contact SRP \$22

The orange wine is made with Criollas grapes from two vineyards in the Uco Valley.

### Paso Tres - Garage SRP \$25

This 'Garage' range includes a Malbec and a Bonarda from certified organic vineyards. The wines ferment and age in concrete.
